



# THE KID WITH

# As well as singing, Kitchen Kid Scott Carne can talk. And talk. And talk! Russell Handley offers a willing ear.

Scott James Carne is the lead singer of Kids In The Kitchen. He's nineteen, pretty and well on his way to being rich and famous. If **Change In Mood** had been merely promising, **Bitter Desire** should seal his fate. That record is simply the best Australian single so far this year, and displays a depth of inspiration beyond any mere beginners luck.

Scott Carne can also talk. And then some. He's an interviewer's dream and nightmare. Ask any question and you'll have to stop him before he writes a book. The Kid could use a sub-editor. We spoke by 'phone. He was in Burleigh Heads in Queensland, hard at work and loving (almost) every minute of it.

So tell us about your new guitarist.

"He's a Jamaican born fellow from New York called Claude Carrenza. He's been with us for about two weeks now (it's mid-June) and it's shaping up remarkably — he's just so good," he enthuses.

So why is Greg Doorman no longer in the band?

"Personal differences. We decided to put Greg on his merry way which was very unfortunate, but there's a lot that happens with success—egos and stuff—and it was just too much. We had to get a new guitarist, which was really Unfortunate as it's a bit of a gamble; a risky thing to do. We weren't happy, we weren't a unit.

'There were forty applicants for this wild ad in a local music magazine down in Melbourne. It was a really full-on ad 'cause we didn't want to put in that Kids In The Kitchen want a guitarist 'cause you'd get so many people ringing up. This ad was about a fourth of a page with a list of requirements; you mut be this, must be that so we could keep away a lot of the dickheads. We finally got Claude after about forty people!" he laughs.

"I tell you what, we just didn't know who was who or what was what. It was such a hard thing to go through. Claude's style is similar to Greg's — we didn't want to get a rock'n'roll guitarist to play funk. The songwriting's more mature now; more feel."

Have you got an album in the works somewhere?

"Everyone said we should have had one out already, or be due to have one out, but we don't want to rush it. We want to do it right and have a good first debut album. I want to be proud of it. I don't want to listen to it in a couple of months

and go 'shit, how and why did I record that!' Too many bands have been rushed in. We've been rushed in a couple of times — the first single and stuff — and we weren't ready for it; everything was new to us. We just did it; we didn't know what the repercussions were going to be. Now we've found out what happens if you rush things and we've decided to take our time as much as we can and decide on the producer and make sure he'll be happy working with us, and us with him." he explains.

Are you thinking of working with David Kershenbaum (the producer of **Bitter Desire**)

"I'd love to work with Dave, but I think I'd like to have a change. I'd like to have a change in producers just to see how things will go."

You got any names floating around?

"We're trying to get Giorgio Moroder. Trevor Horn is too busy and too much money," he laughs.

"We want a change in production so it sounds bigger and better. I love David's work; he's great, but I think the whole band wants a change to learn some new ideas from someone different," he explains

The third Kids In The Kitchen single will be off the album, and will no doubt be released simultaneously. Much to the surprise of all concerned **Bitter Desire** failed to eclipse the success of **Change In Mood**.

"I thought it was a better song than Change In Mood which went to No. 9 nationally; when that was in, it was a quiet period. We thought Bitter Desire would do a bit better. There's so much good 'product' out at the moment; a lot of really good songs by international acts. It's sitting up on the charts, but hasn't reached as high as Change In Mood" he says.

Where did the name Kids In The Kitchen come from?

"The bass player thought it up, actually. It was a kind of the classic situation; we were rehearsing in the lounge room in the early stages and working on this song called **The Beat** which we needed some percussive instruments to help us out with the rhythms. We couldn't afford to buy a set of timbalies or a tambourine so we went into the kitchen and got a few pots and pans! Someone said 'boys in the kitchen' and laughed, but it sort of stuck!"

A gig at a hotel followed; the name offered was 'Kids In The Kitchen'.

"We never expected the name to carry as far

as it did. The name's something you remember. I had doubts earlier on 'cause I wanted something a bit more 'deep and meaningful'. Have you heard of that band in Melbourne 'I Spit On Your Gravy'?"

wonder how Kids In The Kitchen feel about being constantly grouped with Pseudo Echo particularly, but also Real Life as part of some new Melbourne Sound.

"It can't be helped. The thing that I really hate (and they must hate it too) is everytime someone plays Pseudo Echo on the radio, they follow it with Kids in The Kitchen or Real Life or vice versa. It really shits me, actually. Everyone puts Pseudo Echo and us in the same category of music. The only things I think we've got in common is we're young and fresh!"

Kids In The Kitchen have been accused of owing a dept to Simple Minds.

"Oh God (laughs). I think my early dance style might have been similar to Mr Jim's but I don't think I've got anything in common really. If you listen to the music, there's no Simple Minds there."

Let's get back to your album; a lot of bands play live for a couple of years then do a debut album which consists of whatever they've been playing live for the past year. Are you going to write a bunch of new songs now you feel much happier with?

"We could put those songs on the album and it would be OK, but I want the album to be of a world standard. We'll probably keep five or six of our songs. We also want to give Claude a chance to contribute to the album, but we're not going to cut our own throats because Greg's left and not do any of the old stuff."

Did you ever seriously think about doing anything else other than being in a band?

"If I wasn't doing this, I'd probably be sitting in some day job getting bored out of my mind! I really wanted to be in a band, but I never thought I could do anything successful. I just didn't think! had it. My ultimate dream was to play the Sydney Myer Music Bowl in Melbourne. I played that and I thought what the hell do I do now?" he laughs again.

So what's the next dream?

"I don't know . . . play Madison Square Gardens! I think I'm going over the top there, but I thought I was doing that dreaming about playing The Music Bowl in Melbourne. We'll see what happens."

No doubt we will.







reakdancing, 'rap' dancing - call it what you will - evolves in the clubs and (literally) on the streets of New York, in particular the suburb of South Bronx. Its relationship with music is a two way affair and soon there's a group of producers, musicians and D.J.'s mixing and scratching out a soundtrack. Sounds like soul, disco, funk and jazz meets 'Star Wars'

Eventually the dancers make it on to video and film to promote the music, which in turn promotes the dancing.

'Flashdance' is just the tip of the movie iceberg. More feature films are in production and soon kids from Paris to Parramatta and Manchester to Murray Bridge are breaking, popping, jamming, locking and bopping. Is this a trend, or what?

But for the purposes of this article, the date to remember is the 7th of March, 1983. On that day, PolyGram released the debut single by ex-Sex Pistols and Bow Wow Wow manager Mr Malcom McLaren, Buffalo Gals is a monster - that clip, that sound,, those dancers!! It's the beginning .

Breakdancers start popping up in clubs around the country, but it's the showing of the movie 'Breakdance' which finally blows everything wide open. People are dancing in the streets. Disco music (for want of a better term) is once again the single dominant force in popular music, and dancing is becoming an obsession.

ighteen year old Louis Daher is the leader of the Dynamic Break Team, and an instructor at Rap City, located on the fourth floor of a seedy looking building in Sydney's George Street, on the edge of Chinatown. Three times a week Rap City is a place for up to two hundred people to step out. Most of the students are boys; most are under eighteen.

I asked him how this all started. The first film clip I ever saw was Buffalo Gals," he explains. "And by just watching that over and over again, I picked up some basics. In the last six months we've got ourselves a group and opened up Rap City. It takes a lot of practice - at least five days a week. You've got to be fit and if you've got a bit of gymnastics in you, that's good 'cause you've got to be flexi also.

"And you've got to have rhythm. If you haven't got rhythm, it's impossible," he continues.

"I was dancing the normal disco stuff from 1974/75. It wasn't that John Travolta stuff. I've always wanted to dance



Certified multi-media personality Jonofun Coleman tells Samantha Trenoweth what he would do if he was God for a day (which happens next week . . .)







Jonathan Coleman whirls into Sydney's 2MMM-FM offices . . .

"Hi. Sorry I'm late . . . Before we start, I have to make a phone call . . . Here, have a look at the single . . . and this little blurb Warner Bros. put out . . . and look at this . . . This interview just came out. It mentions my girlfriend's name and now she won't speak to me. I thought she'd appreciate the publicity . . . Sorry I smell like a pig. We're doing this Wonder World send-up on Wavelength and I had to play with this pig all yesterday . . . Just can't get the smell off . . .

What with Wavelength, the Wide Boy Youth Single, a new mini-album and a regular show on commercial radio, Jonathan Coleman's life is becoming a mite hectic but, really, that's just a measure of his achievement. So, with fame and fortune possibly just a stone's throw away, what does he see as the secret of his success?

'Just being a real person, I think. Some TV stars/rock'n'roll stars/big bimbos/mega-demigods are so cool and so wonderful and so unbelievably chic that people can't identify with them but people come up to me anywhere and say, 'Hey Jono, how're you going?' It tends to annoy your friends a bit but that's just one of the by-products, unfortunately. You can't say, 'Hold on, I'm not famous today."

'I don't want to get so famous I can't go anywhere. I just want to get well known enough that I can not have to do the things I'm not happy with. It would be great to just do three or four things a year, like a record thing, maybe a book, a bit of radio and a few specials; to be famous enough that I don't have to be on every day of the week and people don't say, 'Oh, not another Jonathan Coleman thing!"

One of Jonathan Coleman's biggest "things" right now is his mini-album - 'Jonathan Coleman's Polka Project' — a collection of comedy, comedy-music and "serious" music, produced and partly co-written by Alan Mansfield (of Robert Palmer, Bette Midler and Dragon fame), along the lines of polka being the next big musical

Another of his big things, and quite a new thing for him, is his, now national, TV show.

I think Wavelength is breaking new ground. When Channel Nine and Triple M approached me about doing a music show, I was worried it would be like all the others. They're all a bit sort of (puts on his impeccably modulated video-jock speaking growl), 'Hi, I'm the host . . . Here's another clip ... and here's so and so ... love the new album . . . tell us about the tour dates . . . There must be more to a music show than that. What I wanted to do was inject some fun.

Now, there are people who write in and say,

really seriously, 'You shouldn't muck around with the videos, man. It's bad karma', like we were making religious jokes or something, but that's what it's all about. Having the technology to put me into a clip is much better than having a boring old set with a couple of dying palm trees and a coffee table.

"It's like Billy Idol said when we showed him some stuff: What we're doing is the ultimate video piracy. These people spend \$200,000 on a video and there's this crazy person popping up in the middle of it."

Though Jonathan will readily admit that Wavelength has a long way to go, he's excited by its potential and optimistic about its future.

The main thing I want to do next is introduce more of the elements that make the radio show work - send-up commercials and real rock'n'roll stars who've got a bit of a sense of humour and who aren't completely up themselves and think they're wonderful and won't do anything without their image going with them.

"Certain Australian bands have shied away from appearing on Wavelength because it's not good for their image - like, 'we're not into chromakey man' - but it was the same on Simon Townsend's Wonder World. Some people used to say, 'I'd rather Jonathan Coleman

didn't do the story,' but probably the larger percentage would say, 'Oh, can you make sure Jonathan Coleman comes out and does it?"

At the moment, Jonathan's prime interest seems to lie in consolidating the footholds he's already gained but, eventually, every young entertainer's gaze turns across the Pacific to the land of hamburgers, hot dogs and the American dream.

'I'd like to get some recognition in America. Not that I want to sell out but it would be nice to show that American comedy isn't the only comedy in the world. Especially when you think Monty Python's big there now and Benny Hill's still big in America. There's got to be a situation over there for a little rounded guy and his Fijian compadre."

The Fijian compadre (don't expect fuzzy hair and a sulu) is, of course, the almost indispensable Dano (lan Rogerson). Jono and Dano have been working together for years now, ever since they were teamed up for a radio show on the ABC's slightly off-beat offspring 2JJJ.

We're like Morecombe and Wise or Abbot and Costello. We'll be working together for a long time. Working with Dano takes a lot of the pressure off me. If people don't like something it's not just me that gets the pooh poured on them."

What sort of things don't people like?

"I've annoyed people with some of the things I've said on radio. This guy rang up the other night and said he wanted to kill me - he was pretty serious - because I'd given out the location of a booze bus. I'd just said that a bus had broken down and that the police were in attendance and not to worry, that there were plenty of blue lights on top of the bus so you could see where it was. Then this guy rang up and went berserk. It freaked me out a bit."

Strangely, the reason Jonathan Coleman originally got into comedy was to avoid such disturbing incidents as threats upon his life.

"All I want to do is get on with people. I just can't handle aggro. That's the whole reason why I got into making people laugh, I think. Because, at school, I wanted to stay on the good side of the bullies. You make them laugh so they're not going to want to beat you up. I just want to keep people happy so they'll say, 'Hey, that Jonathan Coleman, he's a nice guy, we won't kill him now."

At 28, Jonathan Coleman has been making people laugh for quite a while. Is it hard being funny all the time? Does he think he'll ever run out of funny things to say?

"I'm not fun all the time - only in very import-

ant business meetings. I find it hard not to be funny in business meetings and when there's a lot of serious people around . . . but I think the real world is funny. There are so many funny things going on every day in the street. You've just got to read the papers and watch the TV. There's so much funny stuff that happens on TV that's meant to be serious, like the commercials. One motto I've got is, 'there's no such thing as bad television.' I'm a real couch potato."

There is a serious side to Jonathan Coleman. though. He can be serious about his work and he was very serious about the Franklin Dam project. He tried to take a Wonder World camera crew to Tasmania but, when he wasn't allowed, he took some time off work, went alone and got arrested like everyone else. Are there other things he's serious about? If, for instance, he could be God for a day, what would he do?

"Well, if I was God, I'd get rid of all the nuclear stuff we've got today. I'd just erase it from people's minds and memories so they wouldn't know how to do it anymore and wouldn't want to fight with each other all the time. That would be perfect. It's such a great world and there are so many good things happening. It's just such a hassle that there's all this garbage going on with people fighting all the time."
